The following fiscal year 2012-2013 budget plan for the South Carolina Commission for the Blind is submitted for your consideration.

The only request from the South Carolina Commission for the Blind is recurring funds of \$500,000 for matching our largest federal grant, Rehabilitation Services – Basic Support. Rehabilitation Services – Basic Support awards funding in order to provide quality, individualized vocational rehabilitation services, and independent living services to qualified visually impaired consumers leading to competitive employment and social and economic independence. In order for South Carolina to receive this funding, a 21.3% match is required.

As members of the House of Representatives during tough economic times, I understand how difficult your decisions must be. I commend you for your commitment and efforts to implement sound fiscal policy.



WHERE IS THE BLIND COMMISSION NOW

- After closing two programs and re-adjusting remaining resources, the SC Commission for the Blind currently has the following programs:
- I. Administration
- II. Rehabilitation Services
- III. Older Blind
- IV. Children's Services
- V. Employee Benefits
- 2012-2013 funding for the SC Commission for the Blind is as follows:
- I. General Funds \$2,218,925
- II. Estimated Federal Funds \$7,899,088
- III. Estimated Earmarked Funds \$293,000
- Uses of funds:
- I. General Funds are used for Matching federal funds, Indirect Costs and for State funded programs such as Children's Services
- II. Federal Funds are drawn down from the federal government and used in Vocational Rehabilitation Services, Supported Employment, Independent Living - Older Blind, Independent Living - Part B, and Training
- III. Once earned, Earmarked Funds are used to supplement programs in which they qualify. For example, a donation received for the Older Blind program is used for Older Blind expenditures. More detail on Earmarked Funds is included in the attached.
- The Breakdown by Program/Fund:
- I. Administration \$1,070,477,General Funds; \$9,851,Federal Funds
- II. Rehabilitation Services \$574,266,General Funds; \$6,680,888,Federal Funds; \$234,680, Earmarked Funds
- III. Older Blind \$419,746,Federal Funds; \$50,000,Earmarked Funds
- IV. Children's Services \$141,177,General Funds
- V. Employee Benefits \$433,005,General Funds; \$788,603,Federal Funds; \$8,320,Earmarked Funds



BUDGET REQUEST SUMMARY

 The SC Commission for the Blind is requesting \$500,000 in recurring funds to match the Rehabilitation Services—Basic Support Federal Grant which can best be described in the Summary of Federal Funds.

Summary of Federal Funds:

- Rehabilitation Services Basic Support
 Current Award = \$7,291,274 Required match at 21.3% = \$1,973,369
- II. Independent Living Older Blind Individuals

 Current Award = \$500,065 Required match at 10% = \$55,563
- III. Supported Employment

 Current Award = \$47,142 No match requirement
- IV. Independent Living Part BCurrent Award = \$40,607 Required match at 10% = \$4,512
- V. Vocational Rehabilitation In-Service TrainingCurrent Award = \$20,000 Required match at 10% = \$2,222

Total matching funds required to draw federal awards = \$2,035,666

 As seen here, General Funds of \$2,218,925 do not allow enough to fully match the federal awards and fund the state programs and indirect costs as required by the federal government.

Summary of Other Funds:

The South Carolina Commission for the Blind projects revenue in Other Funds as follows:

- I. <u>Donations</u> \$5,000. Most donations specify the use by the donor. If there is no specification, they are used as match.
- II. <u>Concessions Operator Benefit Account</u> \$150,000. These funds are received and used by the Business Enterprise Program under the Randolph Shepherd Act.
- III. <u>Misc Revenue</u> \$25,000. These funds are received through a contract with South Carolina Health and Human Services for the purchase and provision of targeted case management services. These funds are used to help fund the Children's Services Program which is state funded.
- IV. <u>Sale of Service-PWI</u> \$13,000. These funds are received from out of state consumers or state agencies that send consumers to our facility for training. We have recently learned that these funds should be recorded as Program Income and used as such under the Code of Federal Regulations Part 34, Section 361.63.
- V. <u>Program Income</u>- \$100,000. These funds are received from the Social Security Administration for assisting Social Security beneficiaries and recipients and used under the Code of Federal Regulations Part 34, Section 361.63.

- 27.1. (BLIND: Matching Federal Funds) For the current fiscal year the amount appropriated in this section under Program II for Rehabilitative Services is conditioned upon matching by federal funds to the maximum amount available under the Federal Vocational Rehabilitation Program.

7.1 Key Measures of Mission Accomplishment and Service Performance



In FY 2011, there was a 19% increase in referrals to the VR Program compared to FY 2010. The increase in referrals was attributed to the continual expansion of service delivery to previously unserved and underserved.




Figure 7.1-2 In FY 2011, physical restoration services were provided through the Older Blind Program. Subsequently, a significant number of referrals were received from eye care professionals, resulting in much of the 22% increase in referrals to the Program.



Prevention of Blindness is a 100% state supported program. Since 2008, service delivery in this Program has been severely reduced due to budgetary constraints. Eye care professionals were appropriately notified of the limited funding and made 27% fewer referrals to the Program compared to FY 2010.



Due to budgetary constraints in the school district, as well as an increase in the need for assistive technology/low vision equipment, referrals to the Children's Services Program increased by 30% compared to FY 2010.



In FY 2011, there was a 12% decrease in the total number of successful closures in the vocational rehabilitation program compared to FY 2010. The decrease was attributed to vacant counselor positions as well as South Carolina's unemployment rate.



In FY 2011, the closure quality rate decreased by 5% compared to FY 2010. The decrease in closure quality was attributed to the decrease in the total number of successful closures since FY 2010.





The SCCB Consumer Service Programs are as follows: Vocational Rehabilitation, Older Blind, Prevention of Blindness, Independent Living and Children's Services. In FY 2011, there was a 1.6% decrease in the total number of consumers served compared to FY 2010. The decrease was attributed to a decline in the total number of consumers served in the Prevention of Blindness Program.


