- 24/7/365 psychiatric assessment team, triage, and referral service
- Team responds to calls from the community and from law enforcement
- Mobile crisis team members go anywhere in the community except emergency departments to provide triage, assessments, and referrals
- ➤ Since 7/1/18, A/MC has responded to 1115 calls, walk ins, or LE drop offs
- EMS supervisors and Mobile Crisis clinicians connect via video to complete psychiatric assessments for patients
- Ambulance returns to service when EMS supervisors arrive on scene to take over
- > 58% of calls are diverted from an ED and/or hospital

Tri-County Crisis Stabilization Center



- 10 bed, voluntary ED, hospital, and jail diversion program for those in psychiatric crisis
- Also acts as a triage service for law enforcement and a drop-off alternative, 2019 Healthcare and Regulatory Subcommittee Meeting Page 27 of 50

- Interagency Behavioral Health Team at Prisma Richland Emergency Department diverted 4,351 patients from the Emergency Department during FY 2018
- Dramatic decrease in length of stay waiting for an inpatient bed from a week or more in 2004 to 44 hours in 2018
- ➤ A Center Mental Health Professional on duty at Prisma Richland Emergency Department 8:00 a.m. to midnight seven days per week
- During FY 2019, CAMHC expanded its Mental Health Court program, a voluntary jail diversion program
- 14 active school-based therapists covering a total of 29 schools in Richland County School Districts 1 and 2 and Richland/Lexington School District 5
- Suicide Prevention Psychotherapy Program designed for patients who are at a high risk of suicide who do not meet hospitalization criteria
- Metropolitan Child Advocacy Center (MetCAC) the only state-funded Child Advocacy Center in South Carolina, whose primary mission of conducting forensic interviews and medical exams of children referred by local law enforcement and DSS agencies due to allegations of abuse or neglect
- FY 2019 YTD 622 center patients have received 622 services via SC DMH's Telepsychiatry Program


