

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AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

The Office of Regulatory Staff (ORS) is charged with representing the public interest in utility regulation. Pursuant to S.C. Code Ann. §58-3-530 (2015), the State Regulation of Public Utilities Review Committee, or PURC, is the oversight body for the Office of Regulatory Staff. The ten-member PURC includes three members from the S.C. Senate, three from the S.C. House of Representatives, and four appointed by the S.C. General Assembly from the general public.



The PURC establishes goals for the ORS that form the agency's strategic plan; these goals have remained constant since the agency's inception. Performance measures are categorized as objectives or action items under the plan's goals. Each year, the PURC evaluates the agency based on its goals and performance measures.

Under the ORS' overarching mission, the following five strategic goals are the touchstones for the agency's annual strategic planning and assessment of performance:

- 1. The ORS is responsive to the public.
- 2. The ORS promotes excellence in each regulated industry.
- 3. The ORS operations provide value to the citizens of South Carolina.
- 4. The ORS is alert and anticipates state and federal regulatory and industry developments and their effects on South Carolina.
- 5. The ORS operations are marked by professional excellence.

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INTRODUCTION

Much of Fiscal 17-18 was dominated by events related to the VC Summer Units 2 and 3 Nuclear Construction Project (the Project). The aftermath of SCE&G's abandonment of the Project, in terms of ORS' efforts to represent the public interest, has and will continue to consume significant resources at the ORS for the foreseeable future.

Mission change. As FY 17-18 drew to a close, Act 258 became law (effective date: June 28, 2018). Through this legislation, public interest is now defined as follows: the concerns of the using and consuming public with respect to public utility services, regardless of the class of customer, and preservation of continued investment in and maintenance of utility facilities so as to provide reliable and high-quality utility services. In FY 18-19, the ORS will be recasting itself to reflect its revised role in utility regulation.

HIGHLIGHTS

<u>Savings</u>

Savings Resulting from Cases. From the agency's inception through June 30, 2018, ORS efforts have resulted in **472** settlements, agreements, and contested cases that generated savings to consumers. Cumulatively, savings to consumers are estimated at over \$1.7 billion.

Over the years, most of this total was the result of settled cases. At the time of this writing (August 2018), the ORS anticipates fewer settlements going forward in keeping with the agency's revised mission that no longer requires the ORS to balance the financial integrity of public utilities with the concerns of the using and consuming public. Instead, savings will be generated primarily from contested cases litigated by the ORS. In FY 17-18, total savings from all matters (contested and settled) is **\$28,736,213**.

Economic Development

Industry Recruitment and Retention. The ORS has supported appropriate economic incentives between utilities and industries expanding or locating within South Carolina. Examples of major economic incentives supported, listed below, total **approximately \$548 million** and create more than **605** jobs in South Carolina over the next several years.

- Swiss Krono One of the world's leading producers of engineered wood products, Swiss Krono is building a high-density fiberboard mill and expanding its laminate flooring production at its existing facility in Barnwell County. Long-term commitment and investment of \$230 million and 105 new jobs expected.
- China Jushi A global manufacturer and promoter of fiberglass products, China Jushi is establishing its first US fiberglass manufacturing operation in Richland County. Long-term commitment and investment of \$300 million and 400 new jobs expected.
- Am Biopharm A full-service peptide and biopharmaceutical manufacturing company headquartered in North Augusta, Am Biopharm is expanding its existing plant in Aiken County. This long-term commitment includes an investment of \$18 million with 100 new jobs expected.

ORS staff, along with representatives from the S.C. Department of Commerce, were involved in several economic development consultations with an existing industry, Volvo, interested in increasing its acquisition of renewable/clean energy and a prospective industry interested in building a plant in the State. The latter, known as Project Eagle, looked at sites in Aiken and Kershaw counties.

<u>Energy</u>

Energy Office Savings to the Public. Saved the public over **\$20 million** through a variety of energy efficiency initiatives including, but not limited to:

- Provided state agencies and nonprofits with low interest loans totaling \$1,223,657 resulting in projected lifetime monetary savings to borrowers of \$4.9 million
- Provided state agencies and nonprofits with \$35,000 in mini-grants to spur innovation
- Approved approximately \$51,000 in renewable tax credits and incentives

State Energy Plan. In FY 17-18, study committees addressed the eight top-tier recommendations of the Plan. Results from this implementation phase (Phase III of the Plan) were mixed. Most committees achieved success in reaching (or making significant headway toward) their goals, but a few faced challenges that stymied their progress. Most apparent among these was the Act 236 study committee whose members were on opposite sides of solar legislation pending at the State House. Near the end of the fiscal year (June 2018), at the direction of the PURC, the Energy Office led a reconvening meeting of the Act 236 study committee and achieved a consensus among the stakeholders to move forward with regular meetings and to work collaboratively. This process will continue in FY 18-19.

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Outreach Technology Initiatives. The Energy Office created a central hub for South Carolina-specific energy data and information via a newly launched SC Energy Data section of ENERGY.SC.GOV. This new section updates data included in the South Carolina State Energy Plan. It provides information on total energy use and cost per capita, electric, natural gas, renewables, and transportation.

In addition, Palmetto Clean Fuels -- an initiative of the Energy Office -- launched a website to highlight the Transportation fuel Action Tool (TAT). This tool was created with support from the US Department of Energy's Clean Cities Coalitions to assist public and private fleet managers and other decision-makers when considering the acquisition of new vehicles. This tool serves to inform fleet managers and decision makers by using current fleet data, comparisons of alternative fuel vehicle acquisitions to their petroleum counterparts, and area-specific analysis.

Consumer Protection and Assistance

The ORS provided both consumers and utilities the support to arrange installment payments, extensions to payment due dates, manageable security deposits, and access to community financial assistance resources. The agency worked with consumers and utilities to recover funds due to erroneous charges, refunds of deposits, unauthorized charges, incorrect rates being charged, or disputes about charges.

In addition, the agency has initiated consumer-assistance programs such as the deposit waiver for domestic violence victims. In FY 17-18, this program benefited **56** individuals who were victims of domestic violence. The program resulted from an innovative agreement facilitated by the ORS with each of the investor-owned electric and gas utilities and women's shelters to waive the initial credit and deposit requirements for domestic violence victims. Since its inception several years ago, the program has benefited **431** individuals.

The South Carolina Equipment Distribution Program (SCEDP), housed within the ORS, helps consumers who are hearing- or speech-impaired by providing them with specialized telephone equipment. In FY 17-18, SCEDP continued its expanded outreach around the State including distribution of over **37,000** publications and printed materials. The program received and reviewed **647** applications, approved **600** applications, coordinated and shipped **1,483** pieces of equipment, and coordinated equipment installation for **74** clients.

VC Summer Units 2 and 3

The aftermath of SCE&G's abandonment of the VC Summer Nuclear Units 2 and 3 Project has dominated much of the time and resources of the ORS during FY 17-18 and will continue to do so in FY 18-19 and perhaps beyond. Tremendous amounts of staff time and resources across multiple departments have been devoted to preparations for the various litigations arising from this abandonment. In addition, the ORS continues to monitor activity at the VC Summer site, which now primarily consists of activities related to security and demobilization/abandonment.

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RISK ASSESSMENT AND MITIGATION STRATEGIES

1) Staffing

<u>Goal.</u> To retain capable staff, attract new talent, and retain outside experts and outside counsel for legal proceedings. This goal is especially pressing in light of managing the heavy workload brought on by the VC Summer Units 2 and 3 legal proceedings while also conducting the ongoing work in all areas of the agency.

The ORS recommends that the General Assembly continue its outstanding support that has allowed the agency to fulfill its mission in representing the public interest in utility regulation.
