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AGENCY’S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

As our state’s lead public health agency, the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC) plays a vital role in protecting the health of the public and the environment. The importance of our mission is emphasized during emergency responses to public health threats like COVID-19.

While we, as a nation and a state, continue to undergo significant public health and environmental challenges, we remain steadfast in our commitment to **protecting the health and safety of all South Carolinians**. From responding to the ongoing historic public health pandemic to successfully transitioning to eWIC to investigating a fire in a construction and demolition debris pile to combating opioid abuse, DHEC’s employees once again demonstrated their dedication to our shared vision of *healthy people living in healthy communities*.

As we continue to chart our path toward excellence, it will remain critical that we measure our progress by continuously reviewing and enhancing our agency’s **strategic plan**. With our core values of *embracing service, inspiring innovation, promoting teamwork* and *pursuing excellence* always in the forefront, our strategic plan helps guide us as we work to achieve a culture of continuous improvement. Doing this will require us to look at ways we can strengthen our relationships with our community partners, build on our existing infrastructure and better develop and recruit a skilled, productive workforce.

To achieve our mission to **improve the quality of life for all South Carolinians by protecting and promoting the health of the public and the environment**, we recognize that we can’t do it alone. It will take all of us working together to safeguard our state’s resources and to strike the important balance between supporting South Carolina’s economic development and promoting and protecting the public health and environment of our great state.

These priorities align with our agency’s strategic plan and are intended to guide us closer to our aspiration of becoming a preferred public sector employer. Doing this will require us to continue to look at ways that we can better develop and recruit a skilled, productive workforce. This includes remaining steadfast in our commitment to our strategies, which outline DHEC’s ambitious and overarching goals.

AGENCY STRATEGIES:

- **Education and Engagement:** Engage our team members, stakeholders and communities by providing them access to relevant and timely information and education to improve quality of life and health outcomes.
- **Science in Action:** Utilize sound science, quality data and analytical processes to make fully informed, well-reasoned decisions that instill trust and confidence in the agency’s expertise and decision-making capabilities.
- **Leadership and Collaboration:** Collaborate with our partners, contribute expertise and lead efforts to establish a strong public health system that advances health and environmental protection on a state, regional and national level.
- **Service and Accessibility:** Facilitate access to and delivery of dependable, timely, professional and culturally appropriate services to meet the needs of communities and our partners.
- **Operational Excellence:** Develop our people, strengthen our processes and invest in our technology to support a high-performance organization and a culture of continuous improvement.

The examples shared throughout this report spotlight how deeply committed DHEC is to continuous improvement and serving South Carolina.

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DHEC BY THE NUMBERS: Our team’s talents and dedication to public service improve the lives of South Carolinians every day. The agency performs countless important functions impacting nearly every citizen of our state. This includes preparing for and responding to emergent public health events like COVID-19, while ensuring that our day-to-day operations remain intact. These day-to-day activities are extensive. Here's a snapshot of what "business as usual" looks like for DHEC:

- In FY 2020, we had **538,583 clinical client encounters** in our local health departments, including:
 - 410,174 Women, Infant and Children (WIC) visits
 - 102,256 Preventive Health visits
 - 26,153 Immunization visits
- Our infectious disease experts investigated a total of **572 acute disease outbreaks** in 2019. During this time period, our staff also received and reviewed **63,634 reports of acute diseases** (including laboratory reports and morbidity reports).
- In FY 2020, more than **3 million laboratory tests** were performed by our Public Health Laboratory, including the evaluation of **641 clinical isolates** for enhanced multi-drug antibiotic resistance.
- In FY 2020, more than **294,430 requests for birth and death records** were received.
- In 2019, our Environmental Affairs team conducted over **61,000 inspections**, covering programs as diverse as recreational waters, underground storage tanks and air quality.
- During this time, Environmental Affairs also managed more than **47,500 active environmental permits** for asbestos projects, private wells, septic tanks, industrial storm water general permits, mines and more.
- In addition, our Bureau of Environmental Health Service team responded to and investigated **24,511 complaints**, ranging from rabies exposures to open burning to emergency response spills and more.
- During FY 2020, our Healthcare Quality team conducted **6,553 inspections and investigations** of health facilities, providers and equipment. Other notable numbers for Healthcare Quality are:
 - **2,893 new prescription monitoring program (PMP) users** registered
 - **2,882,384 PMP patient queries** during June 2020
 - **10,700 law enforcement officers** and **1,763 firefighters** trained to carry and administer naloxone to combat opioid overdoses in 2019
 - **79 Certificate of Need (CON) decisions** issued

While we continue to perform these critical health and environmental services, 2020 has proven to be anything but “business as usual.” Our agency is now approaching 200 days since our Incident Command Structure (ICS) was first activated in March. As a result, we saw decreases in services such as immunizations which were attributed to a decline in both patient appointments being available due to DHEC staff being pulled for COVID-19 response efforts in addition to patients not coming in for their appointments for fear of catching COVID-19. In addition, many of our staff have been called on to work long hours, under immense pressure for an extended period of time. They have done so while being pulled away from their standard assigned work duties and program areas, as well as their families and loved ones. While their work has been commendable, this is not sustainable for the wellbeing of our agency or employees. Moving forward, we have operationalized our agency’s response efforts by formalizing a COVID-19 event response team to ensure that case investigations occur in a timely manner and that we are able to maintain standard operations.

EVENT RESPONSE: DHEC continually prepares to respond to events that may impact the health of the public and the environment. The agency is proud of our response efforts to both routine and extraordinary events, including a global pandemic, Hurricane Dorian, the Able Construction fire, a statewide Hepatitis A outbreak and support of the Governor’s efforts to end opioid abuse in South Carolina.

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COVID-19 PANDEMIC

In late 2019, with reports growing about an outbreak of pneumonia of unknown origin coming out of Wuhan City, China, DHEC public health staff began to follow updates from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) as well as from global health agencies. In January of 2020, the CDC issued a health alert regarding the COVID-19 outbreak and DHEC’s Division of Acute Disease Epidemiology shared it with South Carolina’s healthcare providers through DHEC’s Health Alert Network and began preparing for the arrival of the virus in our state.

As the state’s lead public health agency, DHEC continues to take proactive steps to prepare for more cases in South Carolina. From early on, many DHEC staff members and our partners have worked through the night and throughout the weekend to keep up with the latest information as well as to prepare South Carolina for the encroachment of this virus into our state. This includes completing in-person infection control inspections of all **194 nursing homes** in the state, working with CMS to award grant funding to **129 nursing homes** to ensure that residents and loved ones can stay connected through communications technologies, extending regulatory flexibility and compliance assistance to about **156 entities** through our Environmental Affairs program, conducting **10,074 virtual inspections** of Retail Food Establishments to maintain food safety standards and more.

DHEC also continues to work with critical community partners to implement our statewide testing plan. As part of our enhanced testing effort, DHEC and our partners, as of early September 2020, have held more **than 900 mobile testing event**, established over **200 stationary testing clinics**, received over **1 million test results** (21.8% which resulted at DHEC’s Public Health Lab), provided **45 nursing homes** with point of care antigen testing devices from the federal government and trained **306 EMS personnel** and **25 National Guard medical personnel** to provide COVID-19 testing. To support these efforts and others, **2,087 DHEC staff** have worked **551,437 hrs.** so far as part of the response. On an average weekday in July, **822 staff** were working on COVID-19.

In addition, as we move further into hurricane season, it will be even more critical for South Carolina to incorporate COVID-19 precautions and procedures into its storm response plans. DHEC and the South Carolina Emergency Management Division are taking innovative measures for adhering to COVID-19 prevention guidelines during medical evacuation procedures and the organization of medical needs shelters. While the S.C. Department of Social Services is planning for general population shelters, DHEC is responsible for coordinating safe, secure sheltering options for residents with specific medical needs, such as those who need access to power or those whose medications require refrigeration. Also included in this strategic planning is creating COVID-19-only locations for those recovering from the virus. Additionally, DHEC is implementing across-the-board infection control monitoring that protects residents and those who care for them. This is an emerging, rapidly evolving situation. DHEC continues to work with federal, state and local officials, providers and community partners to stop the spread of COVID-19 in our communities.

HURRICANE DORIAN

When Hurricane Dorian threatened the South Carolina coast in late August and early September 2019, hundreds of DHEC staff were active in preparing for anticipated public health and environmental needs, including assisting in the evacuation of coastal health care facilities and conducting pre-storm assessments of dams expected to be impacted by heavy rain and flooding.

To prepare for Hurricane Dorian, DHEC activated its ICS and the agency and regional coordination centers worked together to coordinate and provide resources to multiple response activities across the state. The agency also assessed more than **30 dams** expected to receive five inches of rain or more. During the storm, staff worked around-the-clock to ensure the safety of the **175 regulated health care facilities**, including **13 hospitals** impacted by medical evacuations. DHEC also opened **five Special Medical Needs Shelters (SMNS)**, housing **58**

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patients whose medical conditions exceeded the capabilities of general population shelters but were not severe enough to require hospitalization. To support the safety of these and other individuals, DHEC facilitated transport for more than **7,000 patients and caregivers** to SMNS and hospitals statewide. After the storm, DHEC continued its around-the-clock efforts to protect public health and the environment by coordinating the safe transport and reentry of more than **7,000 evacuated patients**, communicating with impacted drinking water and wastewater facilities and conducting coastal damage surveillance, among many other efforts.

HEPATITIS A OUTBREAK

While much focus is placed on the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, South Carolina continues to experience a statewide hepatitis A outbreak that began in the spring of 2019. In May 2019, DHEC took proactive precautions to interrupt the increasing spread of hepatitis A cases in Aiken County and other parts of South Carolina. This included establishing a hepatitis A taskforce, and then a modified ICS structure, to coordinate efforts to control the spread of the disease, increasing vaccination rates among high-risk groups, establishing partnerships critical to reaching those groups and conducting outreach and education efforts. Our targeted immunizations efforts have included offering no-cost hepatitis A vaccines to people who use drugs, people who are homeless, men who have sex with men or those who have a history of incarcerations. These vaccination events are conducted at local parks, correctional facilities and homeless shelters in order to reach people who are most at risk. As of June 2020, we have provided more than **13,000 vaccinations** during this outbreak response. DHEC staff have worked with local elected officials, correctional facilities, churches, community coalitions, EMT, homeless shelters/encampments and medical providers to present information about hepatitis A and provide educational materials so they can implement additional preventive measures locally.

ABLE CONTRACTING, INC

Following reports of smoke, DHEC began investigating a fire in the construction and demolition debris pile at Able Contracting, Inc. in Jasper County last summer. The Able Response Team, consisting of the four bureaus of Environmental Affairs, was organized to pursue efforts to protect the health and safety of the public and the environment. They worked tirelessly to keep the community and general public informed, while monitoring and minimizing the impact of the fire on the surrounding communities. Throughout the response, the team worked together to ensure resources were managed effectively and that data were efficiently collected from air monitoring and surface water and drinking water samples. A dedicated webpage was created to provide daily, real-time data and other updates for the public. Information included a smoke forecast, total tons of debris removed, the number of dump trucks that entered the site and air quality sensor readings. Aerial drone images and video were also periodically shared. In addition, the Able Contracting Information Hotline was established to provide the daily forecast and allow the community to leave messages if they had additional questions. DHEC employees from across the agency were in contact with Jasper County residents and businesses daily, often working after hours. This included providing targeted outreach to at-risk communities. With many Hispanic residents living near the Able site, interpreters accompanied regional staff during home visits to share information about the air and drinking water. As a result of the team’s coordinated efforts with local emergency responders and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the Able Contracting fire was extinguished, and **12,084 trucks** removed **115,138 tons** of material from the site.

LEON PROGRAM & PRESCRIPTION MONITORING PROGRAM

In December 2017, DHEC joined Governor Henry McMaster’s Opioid Emergency Response Team in a united front to end opioid abuse in South Carolina. As part of this effort, we continued to work alongside the S.C. Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services (DAODAS) and other key stakeholders to address awareness, prevention and treatment of the use and misuse of opioids.

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Starting as an unprecedented collaborative effort between the Fifth Circuit Solicitor’s Office, DAODAS and DHEC, the Law Enforcement Officer Naloxone (LEON) program consists of training, educating and equipping law enforcement officers to carry and administer the opioid antidote Naloxone to victims of a suspected opioid overdose. The success of LEON is due to the extensive collaboration with multiple agencies to solve a part of the opioid crisis. To date, **228 Law Enforcement Officer agencies** have joined the program, over **10,700 officers have been trained** and **1,517 lives have been saved**. In 2019, the Reducing Opioid Loss of Life (ROLL) was established to support Narcan training for firefighters. Since the program was established, **107 fire departments** have joined the program, **1,736 firefighters have been trained** and **232 additional lives have been saved**. Additionally, our agency’s Bureau of Drug Control is leveraging the effectiveness of its prescription monitoring program, known as SCRIPTS (South Carolina Reporting & Identification Prescription Tracking System) to further intensify efforts to combat opioid abuse. During FY 2020, we registered **2,893 new prescription monitoring program users**. We also worked with several facilities and pharmacies to successfully integrate monitoring reports directly into the electronic health record systems and pharmacy dispensing systems. Since August 2017, DHEC has issued quarterly prescriber cards to more than **8,000 practitioners** who prescribe opioids to inform them about certain prescribing trends and specialty comparisons. We expect these numbers to continue to increase for 2020 as more practitioners and pharmacists use SCRIPTS.

AGENCY ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND CHALLENGES

As part of our effort to be the preeminent state public health and environmental protection agency in the nation, we remain committed to building and sustaining our talented team, reinvesting in our infrastructure and strengthening our partnerships across the state. We face challenges but are focused on tackling each one of these opportunities, some of which are discussed below.

eWIC TRANSITION

In 2019, South Carolina’s Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program successfully completed its statewide transition to SCWIC, a new Management Information System (MIS), as well as an electronic benefits transfer (EBT) system also known as eWIC. The transitions took place ahead of schedule and below budget. eWIC brings many benefits to our WIC participants, vendors and staff such as faster checkouts, flexible purchasing and quicker payment processing for WIC vendors. It does this by automating a great deal of the WIC process by eliminating a paper system of checks and vouchers. As part of the roll out, staff across the state’s **76 WIC** clinics worked collaboratively to conduct over **8,000 testing hours** and provide **1,200 hours of training**. Thanks to this work, the new system now impacts **649 approved retailers** and over **80,000 WIC participants**. This transition was part of a federal mandate requiring all WIC state agencies to implement EBT systems by 2020.

ePERMITTING

DHEC's Environmental Affairs team is in the process of transitioning to one database system, with online user access, that manages permitting and compliance, as well as fees, inspections and federal reporting. As one of the agency’s largest projects, the move to ePermitting was a significant effort and is focused on modernizing the business of environmental protection. This online software system will allow our customers to electronically do business with the agency in a timely and streamlined manner. Benefits from the completion of the transition will include increases in application processing efficiency by reducing lead time associated with mailing and data entry, reduction of permitting timeframes and support of the state’s economic goals and the creation of a one-stop-shop for regulated entities by co-locating multiple program area data on one site. It also will support easy access for applicants, permittee, registrants and licensees to their documents and approvals, as well as reduce regulatory burdens and enhance compliance reporting through online submittals. DHEC is the first state environmental program to take on an "enterprise" system with the overall goal of automating all of our services. Because the move from DHEC's current database is complex and focuses on an enterprise system, the agency plans to roll out individual programs as the system is fully developed over the next couple of years.

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TALENT RECRUITMENT AND EMPLOYEE RETENTION

DHEC, like many government agencies, is facing an upcoming wave of employee retirements as more than a third of the agency’s workforce is eligible to retire within the next three to five years. Meanwhile, **42 percent of employees** have been with the agency less than five years. Succession planning, knowledge transfer, recruiting and employee retention are critical success factors for the agency moving forward. To prepare for anticipated staff attrition, we are aggressively working to implement several succession planning, recruiting and retention initiatives designed to make DHEC the premier employer in South Carolina. This includes:

- Working with the S.C. Department of Administration to obtain increased hiring salary ranges for key positions to compete with the private sector
- Implementing a comprehensive, electronic talent management system that includes modules for succession planning, onboarding and performance review
- Piloting a position-based succession plan that will focus on critical roles that are occupied by retirement eligible employees and other critical positions that could impact business operations

In addition, DHEC began hosting an annual career fair in 2017 to boost recruiting of critical jobs and recognition of the agency within the community. After increasing attendance by **38 percent** in March 2018, we engaged other state government agencies to build upon the success of the career fair. In 2019, **four additional agencies** joined DHEC to create the State Government Career Fair: Department of Corrections, Department of Social Services, Department of Health and Human Services and Office of State Human Resources.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

I. Risk Assessment and Mitigation Strategies:

DHEC continues the process of implementing agency-wide risk assessment tactics and developing appropriate mitigation strategies. If DHEC does not accomplish its goals and objectives, risks categorized at the highest level could have a substantial impact on public health and the environment in South Carolina. Examples include: disease outbreak; environmental contamination; increased mortality; decreased or delayed medical care and diagnosis; increased medical costs; decreased oversight; and the inability to respond to a public health or environmental disaster.

Strategies to address the above impacts include partnering with other agencies and private entities whose missions and vision align with the examples outlined above. State partnership examples include: hospitals and physicians; medical associations; Rural Infrastructure Authority for water and sewer; Clemson Extension Service for food safety; S.C. Department of Health and Human Services for public health; S.C. Department of Natural Resources for environmental affairs; S.C. Emergency Management Division for emergency preparedness and response; and state colleges/universities for laboratories. Additional state health and environmental agencies and laboratories are available as needed. Federal assistance could potentially be provided through U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Centers of Disease Control, Federal Emergency Management Agency, National Regulatory Commission, U.S. Health and Human Services and U.S. Department of Agriculture.

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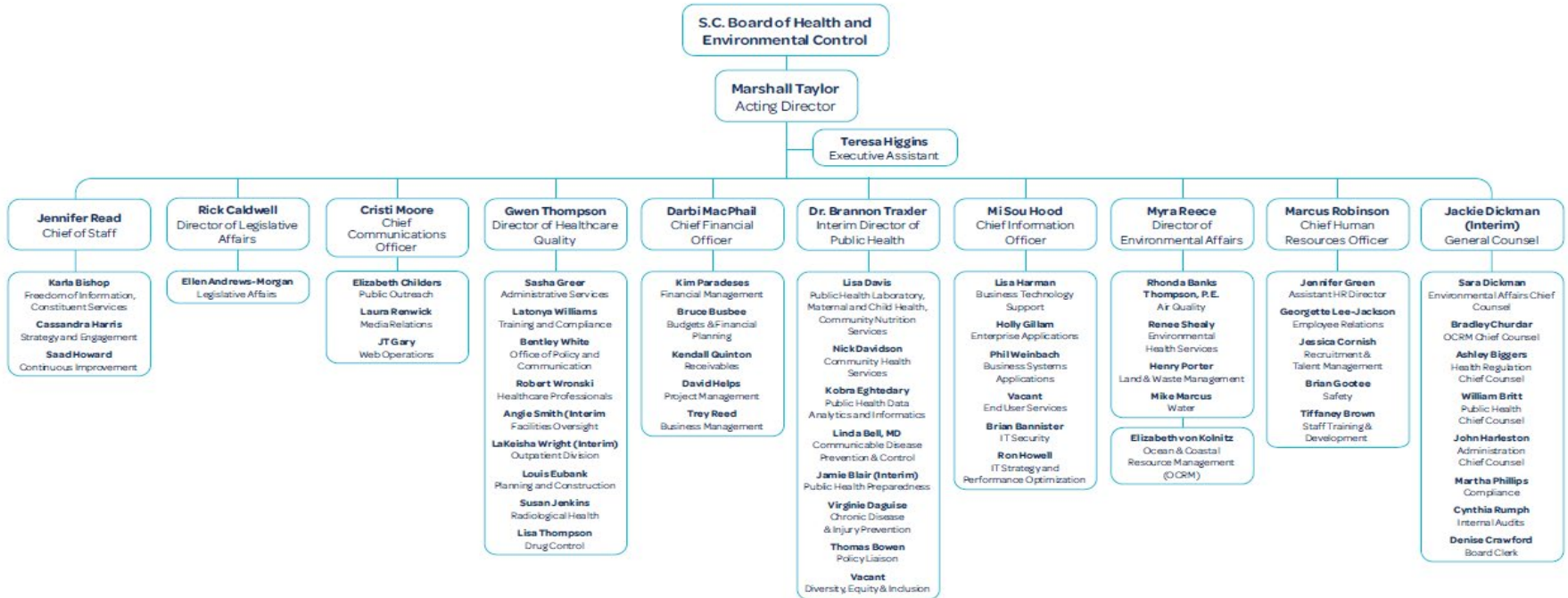
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ORGANIZATIONAL CHART
