2 "(A) The South Carolina Department of Employment and 3 Workforce, in collaboration with shall assist the State Board for 4 Technical and Comprehensive Education and the Commission on 5 Higher Education, shall assist, the Department of Education, and the 6 Commission on Higher Education in planning and promoting the 7 career information and employment options and preparation 8 programs provided for in this chapter by: 9 (1) identifying potential employers to participate in the 10 career-oriented learning programs; (2) serving as a contact point for employees seeking career 11 12 information and training; (3) providing labor market information including, but not 13 limited to, supply and demand; 14 15 (4) promoting increased career awareness and career 16 counseling through the management and promotion of the South 17 Carolina Occupational Information System; (5) collaborating with local agencies and businesses to 18 19 stimulate funds; and 20 (6) cooperating in the creation and coordination of workforce 21 education programs." 22 23 SECTION 6. Section 59-59-210 of the 1976 Code, as added by Act 24 88 of 2005, is amended to read: 25 26 "Section 59-59-210. An appeal of this recommendation must be made by the governing 34 board of an affected institution within sixty days to the Senate 35 Education Committee and the House Education and Public Works 36 37 Committee, which shall hear the parties to the appeal. If the 38 committees concur in the recommendation for termination, the program will be terminated at a time to be determined by the 39 40 commission.
