 - v. Posting Promising Practices;
 - vi. “At-Risk” Students;
 - vii. Personnel Interaction Tracking System; and
 - viii. Demographic Data Collection from Applications.

- IV. Representative Jefferson provides a list of internal changes implemented by WLG regarding the following topics:
 - i. Reviewing Marketing Strategies;
 - ii. Raising the Age Limit; and
 - iii. Mental Health Intervention.

- V. Representative Williams asks Representative Jefferson questions regarding the board training recommendation.

VII. Chairman Newton announces that the Education and Cultural Subcommittee study on the Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School is approved.

Discussion of the Department of Motor Vehicles

- I. Representative Hixon provides an overview of the Economic Development, Transportation, and Natural Resources Subcommittee’s study on the Department of Motor Vehicles, or “DMV.”

- II. Representative Hixon states that the subcommittee has 29 individual recommendations arising from the DMV study. Further, he states that the recommendations include topics regarding:
 - i. Efficiency;
 - ii. Consumer Protection;
 - iii. Regulatory Review;
 - iv. Conformity with Current DMV Practice;
 - v. Informing Constituents;
 - vi. Driver’s Licenses and Identification Cards;
 - vii. Motor Vehicle Registration and Sales;
 - viii. License Plates;
 - ix. Customer Service; and
 - x. Finances.

- III. Mr. Kevin Shwedo, Executive Director of the South Carolina Department of Motor Vehicles, under oath, addresses Committee member questions regarding Real ID implementation, service fees, the DMV emergency contact program, license plates, insurance, and temporary tags issued by out-of-state used car dealerships.

- IV. Representative Stringer moves, and after discussion on the issue, withdraws a motion to send the DMV study back to subcommittee. Members involved in the discussion of the issue include: Representative Caskey, Representative Hixon, and Representative Pendarvis.
- V. Representative Hixon moves for the committee to adopt the DMV study recommendations, including the changes discussed at this meeting regarding the in-person fee applying only to commercial customers.

- VI. Chairman Newton announces that the Economic Development, Transportation, and Natural Resources Subcommittee’s study on the South Carolina Department of Motor Vehicles is approved, including the changes made during the meeting.

Discussion of the South Carolina Aeronautics Commission

- I. Representative Clary provides an overview of the Executive Subcommittee’s study of the South Carolina Aeronautics Commission, or “Aeronautics.”

II. Representative Clary states that the subcommittee has 10 recommendations for the agency and seven for the General Assembly. Further, he states that the recommendations include topics regarding:

- a. Lack of Minority Representation on Commission;
- b. State Official Business Flights;
- c. Centralization of Manned Aircraft Information;
- d. Centralization of Unmanned Aircraft Information;
- e. Funding;
- f. Transparency;
- g. Accountability Procedures;
- h. Modernization of Laws;
- i. Grant Funding Prerequisites;
- j. Waiver Request; and
- k. Aircraft Mileage Assessment for Property Taxes.

III. Mr. James Stephens, Executive Director for the South Carolina Aeronautics Commission, under oath, addresses the Committee regarding the Columbia Airport property, staff diversity, publication of flight logs, substance-screening procedures for pilots, the relationships between different aviation authorities, and aviation education.

IV. Representative Clary moves for the study to include three additional recommendations relating to updating statutes, posting of budget control report on the Aeronautics website, and sending additional information to the Secretary of State's Office.

Study of the Rural Infrastructure Authority: Executive Summary

The full report of the Economic Development, Transportation, and Natural Resources Subcommittee's study of the Rural Infrastructure Authority (RIA), issued on October 16, 2019, is available on the House Legislative Oversight Committee's [webpage](#).

Finding

The **Subcommittee has one finding** arising from its study of the agency:

Finding

1. The Subcommittee supports legislative action to provide resources to support statewide access to broadband services, including in rural communities.

Recommendations

The **Subcommittee has five recommendations** arising from its study of the agency. All recommendations are to the General Assembly and relate to modernization of laws.

Recommendations to the General Assembly

1. Consider clarifying the role and responsibilities of RIA's Local Government Division by repealing S.C. Code of Laws § 1-11-25 and amending § 11-50-30(E).
This removes references to an obsolete program and reflects the duties this division had at the time of its transfer to RIA.
2. Consider clarifying RIA's role in coordination of state infrastructure development efforts by amending S.C. Code of Laws § 11-50-30(C).
This could facilitate agency efforts to assess statewide needs and support regional approaches.
3. Consider removing outdated accounting requirements by repealing S.C. Code of Laws § 1-11-26.
For example, this section requires maintenance of a separate bank account for grant funds, which is no longer required with modern accounting practices.
4. Consider updating terminology related to counties in which eligible rural infrastructure projects can be located by amending S.C. Code of Laws § 11-50-40(13).
This replaces the terms "distressed or least developed" with "Tier III or IV," in accordance with related sections of law.
5. Consider defining "environmental facilities" in the Rural Infrastructure Act by amending S.C. Code of Laws § 11-50-40.
Adding this definition makes this section consistent with other laws governing RIA programs.

Purpose of Oversight Study

To determine if agency laws and programs:

are being implemented and carried out in accordance with the intent of the General Assembly



should be continued, curtailed, or eliminated,

the Committee and Subcommittee evaluate:

the application, administration, execution, and effectiveness of the agency's laws and programs;

the organization and operation of the agency;



any conditions or circumstances that may indicate the necessity or desirability of enacting new or additional legislation pertaining to the agency.
