Mission

South Carolina Commission for the Blind









To provide quality individualized vocational rehabilitation services, independent living services and prevention-of-blindness services to blind and low vision consumers, leading to competitive employment and/or social and economic independence.

Agency Overview

South Carolina Commission for the Blind

EMPLOYMENT: Offering **specialized and personalized services** that lead to employment and/or social and economic independence **for individuals who are blind or have low vision**

- Vocational Rehabilitation
 - Helps eligible consumers find, maintain, or regain employment
 - Includes a residential component
 - Consumers may receive counseling and guidance, educational opportunities, vocational training, and assistive technology to prepare for career opportunities
- Business Enterprise Program
 - Helps qualified individuals become self-employed vending or food service facility operators

Agency Overview

South Carolina Commission for the Blind

INDEPENDENCE: We help consumers remain independent within their homes and communities

- Children's Services
 - Assists children ages 3 to 12,
 - Ensures they have assistive technology available at home
 - ▶ Helps with building confidence and self-sufficiency from an early age

PREVENTION

- Financial assistance for sight-saving surgeries for individuals who meet financial need requirements
- Education on blindness prevention and eye safety

Older Blind Services


- Assists those 55 and older not interested in employment
- Statewide low vision assessments
- Helps consumers remain independent by providing specialized training and low vision devices



Older Blind

Increasing Older Population


- South Carolina's older population increasing each year
 - Aging (baby boomers)
 - More individuals retiring to SC
- Vision and eye problems increase with age
 - Macular degeneration
 - Glaucoma
 - Diabetic retinopathy
 - ▶ Cataracts



Older Blind

Increase in Consumers

- More than 1,400 received Older Blind Services in FY24, 700 more than in FY23
- State assistance critical to help meet needs of additional consumers
 - Added 2 FTEs in FY25 to provide more services to more consumers
 - Additional program funds help provide increased services and assistive technology devices



Green = actual number of consumers served Orange = projected number of consumers

Business Enterprise Program

Vending locations statewide

- Blind Licensed Vendors (BLVs) operate 83 vending facilities across the state
 - Includes 28 stand-alone rest stops and welcome centers along interstate highways
 - ▶ New micro markets and accessible kiosks
- ▶ Upgrades in FY24-25
 - More than 150 new snack machines installed statewide in FY24
 - Renovations to sites/facilities (such as updating roofs and adding security gates at rest areas)



Business Enterprise Program

Fort Jackson

SCCB holds one of the largest military contracts in the United States: operating dining facilities at Fort Jackson

- Blind Licensed Vendors operate 10 warrior restaurants
 - Serve a combined average of 750,000 meals each month
- BEP Piloted and implemented the US Army's first "grab and go" market, serving an average of 6,000 meals each month

Summer Teen 2024


- ▶ 30 students aged 13-21 from across the state participated in residential programming held on the University of South Carolina's Columbia campus:
 - Planned travel throughout the Columbia area using different transportation (ride share, public transportation, etc.)
 - Learned about personal finance and budgeting
 - Some completed work-based learning experiences with local employers
