I, Ralph S. Kennedy Jr., will appear to testify concerning the qualifications of the above-named candidate and will produce all documents in my possession, if any, which will further develop or corroborate my testimony.

I understand that this written statement and all supporting documentation, if any, must be completed and the hard copies of all such documents shall be returned to the Judicial Merit Selection Commission by the deadline for complaints in order for the Commission to hear my testimony, and that the deadline for complaints is 12:00 Noon, Monday, October 28, 2024. I understand I must be available to testify at the Public Hearing, and failure to appear will result in a dismissal of my complaint.

In regard to my intended testimony, I will offer information as to the following:

I am Ralph S. Kennedy Jr., South Carolina Bar License No. 7916. I have been a member of the South Carolina Bar since 1986. I am the senior attorney at Kennedy Law Firm, LLC, located in Batesburg-Leesville, SC 29070. I am a former member of the South Carolina House of Representatives for Lexington-Saluda Counties, House District 39, a seat I held from 2012 until 2016. My contact information is the following:

Summary: From my experience and based upon information and belief, it is my opinion that Christian "Chris" Spradley lacks the fitness to serve as a circuit court judge for the State of South Carolina. I am familiar with the JMSC Judicial Qualifications Checklist (last updated June 9, 2021), and I believe Chris Spradley is unqualified under Terms 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, and 8.

Matter One: I have personal experience regarding the lack of candor, honesty, and integrity of applicant Christian "Chris" Spradley that is relevant to his fitness to serve on the circuit court of South Carolina. As a result, I feel compelled to provide this information to the Judicial Merit Screening Committee, and to testify in opposition to Chris's candidacy for circuit court.

In a civil matter that was litigated in Saluda County¹ my firm represented an injured party, Curtis Graham, in recovering the at-fault driver's liability insurance coverage, which we settled for policy limits. We then pursued underinsured (UIM) benefits from our client's own auto insurance carrier. The week prior to trial, counsel for the carrier subpoenaed the deceased defendant's daughter, Teresa Grigsby, to appear at trial of the UIM matter. On Friday, 11/10/2023, Ms. Grigsby, who we believed was unrepresented at that time, contacted me directly after receiving a subpoena from the UIM carrier's attorney. During her call, she mentioned that she had been subpoenaed to trial by the UIM carrier's lawyer, and then asked me if she had to appear at trial. I told her I could not advise her because I did not represent her, but did provide her proof that my client had previously settled with her father (the named, deceased defendant) and his liability insurance carrier under terms of a

Covenant Not to Execute. I also explained that as a result, the upcoming trial was only about coverage under our client's own UIM bodily injury insurance policy.

On that following Monday, 11/13/2023 (the day of trial), just prior to jury selection (with Ms. Grigsby present in the courtroom), I along with UIM carrier's defense counsel went into chambers to discuss preliminary matters with the trial judge. While in chambers, the UIM carrier's counsel accused me of talking to "his" client, referring to Ms. Grigsby, who was clearly not his client under the facts or law of South Carolina. She was not a named party to the lawsuit, nor did she have any legal standing or interest in the matter. We had previously resolved all claims against the deceased defendant, and by extension his daughter, via the covenant, and thus were simply litigating a claim for bodily injury against our own client's underinsured motorist coverage. Opposing insurance defense counsel then also accused me of "directing" Ms. Grigsby to ignore the trial subpoena sent by the UIM insurance carrier's lawyer, when in fact, I had given no such advice or direction.

The trial ended up being delayed for procedural reasons, specifically my <u>Batson</u> motion after defense counsel for the UIM carrier (it was his first trial) struck 5 of 6 jurors of non-white racial makeup (4 African American and 1 Hispanic) whose names appeared on the jury list and that were drawn from the jury panel for this trial. Since the trial was delayed, we subpoened Ms. Grigsby for a deposition, serving Ms. Grigsby a subpoene and notice of deposition as a fact witness, intending to inquire into her knowledge of the collision, her late-father's state of mind, and anything else she might know concerning the collision. We also had to inquire about the false allegations made previously in chambers by the UIM attorney, and if Ms. Grigsby was actually involved in those statements.

On the date of the <u>Batson</u> hearing (11/15/2023), I removed myself from the case because of the allegations previously and erroneously asserted by the UIM defense attorney in Chambers. My son, Carlisle Kennedy, became the attorney of record, and he argued the <u>Batson</u> motion, resulting in a "new jury & trial" being ordered by Judge McLeod.

Ms. Grigsby was served with our subpoena for deposition on 11/20/23. Ten days later, on 11/30/23, Chris Spradley contacted Carlisle Kennedy requesting that this deposition be rescheduled. Spradley informed Attorney C. Kennedy that he (Spradley) had just been contacted by Ms. Grigsby and that he needed additional time to prepare. After some discussion, Chris Spradley then changed his request from merely rescheduling the deposition to canceling the deposition altogether. Spradley informed Attorney C. Kennedy that he (Spradley) did not want to get involved in this matter, that he didn't know Ms. Grisby well, and that he (Spradley) had not spoken with Ms. Grigsby for a number of

years since he last represented her in some other matter. The date of these conversations were 11/30/2023.

The next day, December 1, 2023, Chris Spradley filed as the attorney of record for non-party Ms. Grigsby, and then filed a Motion to Quash the deposition subpoena, accompanied by an affidavit from Ms. Grigsby that contained falsehoods. Chris Spradley's Motion to Quash contained inaccurate and misleading information. Item 4 states that Grigsby "...does not know the Plaintiff' although Grigsby would subsequently testify that she went to school with the Plaintiff. The motion also states, misleadingly, that "Plaintiff's attorney has rejected all offers and has now allowed more time to pass which would make it impossible to properly notice fine deposition for a new day." In fact, only one day had passed since counsel for Plaintiff was made aware of Chris Spradley's involvement in this matter. Attorney C. Kennedy had offered numerous accommodations to Chris Spradley, all of which had been rejected.

During the subsequent hearing before Judge McLeod, it is my recollection that Spradley informed the Court, Attorney C. Kennedy, and UIM defense attorney that he had only spoken with Ms. Grisby after she was served with the subpoena for deposition (thus sometime after 11/20/2023) and that he was hired to represent her solely to get her out of the deposition. Spradley also again claimed that Ms. Grigsby did not know the plaintiff Mr. Graham, which we learned to be inaccurate from Grigsby's eventual deposition. Chris Spradley's motion to quash was denied by Circuit Court Judge Walton J. McLeod IV and the deposition subsequently went forward. It was at that deposition that we learned more fully of Chris Spradley's lack of candor to both us and the Court.

It is worth noting again that the underlying claim was against my client's own UIM insurance bodily injury coverage, and the at-fault driver was Ms. Grigsby's deceased father. Ms. Grigsby was at most a collateral witness and was not an interested party to the case with any potential liability. It was unclear to myself as to why Ms. Grigsby would be so strongly motivated to quash the subpoena for her own deposition.

When Ms. Grigsby was subsequently deposed on December 6, 2023, while represented by Mr. Spradley, Ms. Grigsby told additional falsehoods. But she and Mr. Spradley then claimed that Mr. Spradley had represented Ms. Grigsby for "several years." That was, of course, obviously and significantly at odds with what Mr. Spradley had told Attorney C. Kennedy previously, when Spradley asked to reschedule the deposition, at which time Spradley claimed to have just spoken to Ms. Grigsby for the first time.

At the deposition, Ms. Grigsby also asserted that the package of documents served upon her did not contain a subpoena at all. As mentioned above, we learned in the deposition that Ms. Grigsby had actually gone to school with our client, Curtis Graham, who was African American. (Mr. Graham advised us that Ms. Grigsby had been unkind to him when they knew each other in school, with him insinuating her hostility towards him may have been racially motivated).

I am confident that the testimony provided by Ms, Grigsby in her deposition about her allegedly not being home when the subpoena was served was false. Our investigation verified that she was in fact present at the time the subpoena was served. Our investigator (a retired SLED agent who had also worked for Spradley's law firm) created a report of all vehicles registered to her home address (for both her and others living in the home). All those vehicles were parked in the driveway at the house at the time our investigator served the subpoena and notice of deposition, and provided photos of the cars present at the time of service. Our investigator confirmed both Ms. Grigsby and her husband Lee Grigsby were home when he served the subpoena and other documents that evening. Our investigator also related that he handed the documents to Lee Grigsby. This experienced investigator knew the difference between valid substitute service (service on an adult of sufficient age and discretion residing in the same household) and personal service. Being a meticulous retired SLED agent, he was confident that all documents were served, including the subpoena, and documented the same prior to any questions being raised about sufficiency of service.

Our investigator's photos of the Grigsby vehicles were taken before Ms. Grigsby had made known her false claim that she was not at home, so the existence of the photos was routine. That picture was included in his email notifying us of the completion of successful service on the evening of 11/20/23 around 5:40 pm that same day. Neither Spradley nor Ms. Grigsby were aware of the existence of the photo evidence during the deposition and could not have known her testimony could be refuted.

As can be read and watched in her deposition, Ms. Grigsby stated that she was not home when the subpoena was served and that she arrived home some 20 minutes after service was completed. She then goes on to testify that she took the entire paperclipped pack of papers to her attorney Chris Spradley.

What may be most concerning is that when asked in the deposition how long she (Ms. Grigsby) had been in contact with Attorney Spradley, Grigsby stated that they had a long ongoing relationship, and that she had been in continuing contact with him (Spradley) since 11/10/23, after speaking with the UIM defense attorney and with myself on that date. Ms. Grigsby testified that she sought Chris Spradley's legal counsel after each conversation she had with the UIM defense attorney and with me. That testimony is in direct contradiction to Chris Spradley's statements to both Carlisle Kennedy and Judge McLeod during the hearing that took place two days prior to this deposition. It is unclear why Chris Spradley would tell the attorneys and the Judge something different than what his own client, Ms. Grigsby, testified to, or why would he not want the nature and timing of his involvement to be disclosed to or known by the Court and other parties. It is also unclear why Ms. Grigsby's false testimonies, as proven by the already-existing physical evidence, would correspond with the timeline of conversations she testifies to have had with Spradley.

For reasons I don't understand, Chris Spradley appears to have suborned perjury by Teresa Grigsby

in an effort to avoid the deposition and then furthered that subornation during the eventual deposition. Also during the deposition, Spradley asserted numerous invalid objections, and gave an appearance to have coached Ms. Grigsby to testify that I had told her not to appear at the jury trial which had convened previously but was subsequently delayed by the <u>Batson</u> motion.

Based on my experience with the entire situation, it remains my conclusion that Ms. Grigsby recognized my client (and certainly realized he was African American) at the first aborted UIM trial, and thereafter apparently resolved to take steps to thwart my client's recovery of funds from his own insurance carrier despite the debilitating injuries he sustained in the wreck involving her now-deceased (and at-fault) father. But worse, it appears Chris Spradley assisted her in fabricating a story about alleged improper service, and by having her testify falsely that I told her not to come to trial.

I have no idea why Chris Spradley would seek to implicate me in any wrongdoing, but at a gathering some years earlier, Spradley made a comment to my son, Carlisle, that may provide some insight. Mr. Spradley told Carlisle that he was alright with him (referring to Carlisle) but that he (Mr. Spradley) "detested" me. I have no idea why that would be so. I am certain, however, that he assisted Ms. Grigsby in manufacturing false accusations about me, fabricating testimony and attempting to cripple Mr. Graham's ability to recover from his own underinsured carrier. I do not hold him in high regard for those reasons, among many others.



TO: CARLISLE E. KENNEDY, ESQUIRE, COUNSEL FOR THE DEFENDANT:

YOU WILL PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the undersigned, as counsel for the Witness, Theresa Grigsby, will move to quash the notice of deposition and any alleged subpoena which may have been served November 21, 2023. Copies of the entire package of documents served upon the witness' husband is attached. See Affidavit of Witness to be filed Monday.

Counsel for the Witness Theresa Grigsby has requested a signed proof of service of the alleged subpoena. As of the time of the filing of this Motion none has been received from Mr. Kennedy's office. The basis for the Motion is that any subpoena that may have been served and the Notice of Deposition attached hereto to not compliance with the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure. The rule violations are as follows:

1. Rule 30(a)(1) of the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure states that a witness may be compelled to attend in the county in which they reside, are employed or transacts business. Further it can be taken in the county in which the action is pending. The Witness lives and works in Greenwood County. She has no business



relationships within Lexington County. The ease is pending in Saluda County. The letter insinuates that the deposition will be taken at 125 East Church Street Lecsville SC. This address is in Lexington County. See Affidavit of Witness to be filed. Monday.

- 2. Rule 30(b)(1) of the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure states that everyone shall be given notice of the deposition and that the notice shall state the time and place of the taking of the deposition. The Notice the Witness received does not state where the deposition will be taken. It gives a time but no place.
- 3. Rule 30(h) of the Rules of Civil Procedure states that a video deposition may only be taken in a case in which the prayer for relief involves an amount of \$100,000 or more. The prayer in the complaint only says in "an amount to be determined by a jury."
- 4. Further, there is nothing relevant to the case before the Court which the Witness has knowledge of which could reasonably lead to any admissible evidence. She was not a witness to the alleged incident, she did not treat or care for Plaintiff, she does not know the Plaintiff and has no knowledge of the incident before the Court.

Attorney for the Witness has offered other days for the deposition to take place with proper compliance with the rules, has offered his office as it is in Saluda County, and has offered to have the Witness sign an affidavit in which the witness would answer questions submitted by Plaintiff's attorney. Plaintiff's attorney has rejected all offers and has now allowed more time to pass which would make it impossible to properly notice the deposition for a new day.

Based on the foregoing, the undersigned moves that the alleged subpoena and Notice of Deposition be quashed and for the Court to impose sanctions and award attorney's fees due to the Witness having to hire an attorney to enforce the South Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure.



(e) Submission to Witness; Changes; Signing. When the testimony is fully transcribed the deposition shall be submitted to the witness for examination and shall be read to or by him unless such examination and reading are waived by the witness and by the parties. Any changes in form or substance which the witness desires to make shall be entered upon the deposition by the officer with a statement of the reasons given by the witness for making them. The deposition shall then be signed by the witness, unless the parties by stipulation waive the signing or the witness is ill or cannot be found or refuses to sign. If the deposition is not signed by the witness within 30 days of its submission to him, the officer shall sign it and state on the record the fact of the waiver or of the illness or absence of the witness or the fact of the refusal to sign together with the reason, if any, given therefor; and the deposition may then be used as fully as though signed unless on a motion to suppress under Rule 32(d)(4) the court holds

that the reasons given for the refusal to sign require rejection of the deposition in whole or in part.
