Successes in FY23-24

Resilience Planning and Coordination

Implementation of the Statewide Resilience Plan

Just before the end of FY22-23, SCOR released the state’s first Strategic Statewide Resilience and Risk Reduction Plan (Resilience Plan). The plan identified statewide risks and vulnerabilities and included recommendations to serve as a framework to guide state investment in flood mitigation projects and the adoption of programs and policies to protect the people and property of South Carolina from the damage and destruction of extreme weather events. Since its release, by efforts of both SCOR and statewide partners, there has been significant progress in implementing many of the recommendations outlined in the plan. This year, SCOR organized implementation of the plan into four overarching lines of effort based on 4 key recommendations that will facilitate the implementation of many other plan recommendations. These lines of efforts are listed and included in their own section below: (1) data collection and coordination, (2) watershed planning and coordination, (3) land conservation, and (4) identifying and maximizing funding.

Data Collection and Coordination

This recommendation of the Resilience Plan focuses on SCOR’s coordination with all levels of government to catalog existing resilience related data, identify data gaps, and provide access to data for planning, design, and decision-making. Efforts this year include a study for the development of a Data Coordination Office, efforts to update and improve existing data sets, coordination of statewide modeling efforts, and work to develop the Resilience Atlas to serve as an accessible hub for resilience-related data from SCOR and other sources. SCOR also made the First Street Foundation flood data used in the Statewide Resilience Plan available to any level of government within South Carolina. The forward-looking hazard data set can be critical for local government planning, programs, and decision making by contextualizing current and future risk and vulnerabilities with local priorities.

Watershed Planning and Coordination

Through watershed coordination, SCOR is providing technical planning assistance to communities to identify risks and vulnerabilities, develop actionable solutions, coordinate solutions across the watershed to reduce negative upstream and downstream impacts, and connect communities to regional, state, and federal resources. It is the intention of the Watershed Planning program to build a pipeline for the implementation of resilience projects, programs, and policies at the local level by identifying needs and connecting communities to information and resources to meet their planning and resilience implementation needs. Efforts this year include the development of the Watershed-Based Resilience Planning Program through the hiring of watershed coordinators to work directly with communities in specific watersheds. These coordinators have started traveling the state and meeting with communities to introduce SCOR and its programs, hear about community concerns and needs related to hazard resilience, and begin connecting communities with needed information and resources to address those needs.

Maintain Natural Flood Protection Through Conservation

The Resilience Plan identified areas across the State for conservation that reduce flood impacts to citizens and communities. Utilizing the \$200M added to the Disaster Relief and Resilience Reserve Fund, SCOR has worked this year with conservation partners to conserve properties that provide natural flood protection while also achieving many other benefits for the State. Efforts in this fiscal year include \$40,550,000 approved by JBRC to be used to conserve 4,630 acres.

Identify and Maximize All Available Funding Sources for Resilience Activities

Even before the plan was released, SCOR has been working with partners to identify funding sources for resilience activities. SCOR seeks to apply for, manage, and coordinate to seek grants and other sources of funding to enable the implementation of recommendations in the Resilience Plan and other relevant resilience activities. Currently, SCOR is the lead or a partner in grants totaling over \$184M not including our mitigation or disaster recovery grants. This year, SCOR received notification of award for \$124M from the EPA Solar for All program and submitted 8 federal grant applications.

Awards and Accolades on Resilience Plan

Since the Resilience Plan’s release, it has been recognized at both the state and national level for excellence in planning. The South Carolina State Library recognized the plan with a 2023 Notable State Document Award. The judges applauded the extent to which the plan provides information that assists in making informed decisions, noting the plan’s “descriptive models, orderly and understandable sections, and lasting reference value.”

A broad range of partners are spreading the word about SCOR and the Resilience Plan to their networks. This includes Pew Charitable Trusts and American Flood Coalition, who continue to hold SCOR up as a nationwide resilience leader. SCOR is often called on by local, state, and national partners to share best practices related to the development and implementation of statewide resilience.

The American Planning Association (APA) featured SCOR and the Statewide Resilience Plan in their article: Planning for State Resilience: A 50-State Breakdown. A comparison of how states across the country are approaching flood resilience planning and implementation, the article recognized the plan as a major milestone in South Carolina’s approach to resilience following several disasters. APA noted how many of the recommendations are already moving forward and how the plan was completed through an inclusive process and cooperation at the state level.

Recently, the interest in the plan reached an international audience when representatives visited the SCOR office to discuss lessons learned from the resilience planning process that may be used for similar efforts in Germany.

Mitigation

Steering Committee Approves New Stormwater Infrastructure Funding

In May 2024, the HUD CDBG-MIT Steering Committee approved \$19,705,915 in competitive CDBG-MIT Infrastructure grant funding for 6 stormwater projects. While just \$20 million was available to award

for projects and any cost overruns, SCOR received \$100 million in requests for more than 40 projects in this round alone, demonstrating the need for broad investment in stormwater upgrades. This round of CDBG-MIT Infrastructure awards completes the final allocation of remaining CDBG-MIT Infrastructure funding. These awards bring the total number of stormwater infrastructure projects SCOR is funding, though both CDBG-MIT and ARPA funding, to 44. While not a prerequisite to being funded, chosen projects were developed through CDBG-MIT Plans & Studies funding. This highlights SCOR efforts to see a project through from identifying flooding issues to developing and implementing solutions.

Completion of Ehrhardt Tunnel Project

On June 2023 construction was completed on the Charleston Medical District Tunnel Extension Project at Ehrhardt Street. Frequent flooding in the medical district posed unique and severe risks to patients and healthcare workers when hospital operations were disrupted. The project consists of a deep tunnel extension and drop shaft to drain the street-level stormwater collection system into the tunnel, and pump systems that connect the existing US-17/Spring-Fishburne Project. SCOR awarded the City of Charleston \$10 million in CDBG-MIT funds for this project.

Kick-Off of ARPA Stormwater Infrastructure Projects

This year, SCOR kicked off several stormwater infrastructure projects as part of its ARPA-funded Stormwater Infrastructure Program. This included many public meetings to ensure citizens are informed and involved in the projects as they progress.

Horry County Buyout Program Begins Demolition

On June 20, 2024, the CDBG-MIT program began phase 1 of demolition of 33 homes in the Socastee area of Horry County. Phase 1 demolition is anticipated to be complete by September 2024, with Phase 2 demolition of 25 properties scheduled following Phase 1. This milestone results from an extensive program that launched in June 2021 with the goal of buying out 61 homes on a voluntary basis to get citizens out of harm’s way in repetitively flooded areas and return the property to green space, allowing floodwaters to absorb, reducing impacts to communities. In addition to the Horry County buyout program, SCOR is currently administering 5 other buyout programs in the counties of Chesterfield, Darlington, Dillion, Marion, and Marlboro, with 192 parcels approved to be bought out following applications from local governments. SCOR has acquired 11 parcels in Chesterfield County (Town of Cheraw) and demolition is expected to begin in September 2024. Offers to purchase properties in Marlboro County (City of Bennettsville) have been ongoing since July 2024.

USS Yorktown Phase 1 Assessment Complete

Phase 1 of the USS Yorktown project was completed in December 2023 with a completed assessment of the contaminants within the USS Yorktown. In March, Governor McMaster, SCOR, and Patriots Point held a press conference to give an update on the cleanup and remediation efforts for the USS Yorktown.

Marion County Stormwater Master Plan Receives Award

In February, SCOR and Michael Baker International, the contractor who worked on the plan, accepted the Engineering Excellence award at the American Council of Engineering Companies of South Carolina

gala. Notably named the "Academy Awards of the Engineering Industry," the gala honors the year's most outstanding engineering accomplishments. The Marion County Stormwater Master Plan identifies flooding issues, assesses existing stormwater systems, develops and prioritizes projects, and establishes an implementation strategy for the identified projects. The project was funded using SCOR CDBG-MIT grant funds and is one of 21 plans and studies funded by CDBG-MIT funds to help communities identify solutions to flooding concerns.

Disaster Recovery

SCOR Surpasses 3400 Homes Repaired or Replaced

In January 2024, SCOR announced a milestone in our Disaster Recovery Program with the completion of a total of 3,400 homes through its 3 housing recovery programs funded by HUD CDBG-DR funds following the Severe Storms of 2015, Hurricane Matthew in 2016, and Hurricane Florence in 2018.

Closeout of 2016 Hurricane Matthew CDBG-DR Grant

In June 2024, SCOR finalized its required HUD reporting to effectively conclude this grant program. The Office used Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery funds to repair, replace, or rebuild 1,142 homes damaged by Hurricane Matthew in 2016. Homes in 24 counties were eligible to receive CDBG-DR funding—including four ‘most impacted and distressed (MID)’ counties to which approximately 81.5 percent of the \$95 million total grant funds were allocated: Georgetown, Horry, Marion, and Williamsburg. Additionally, SCOR complied with HUD policies to prioritize homes belonging to low and moderate-income (LMI) residents. Excluding administrative and planning costs, 100 percent of the grant funds benefitted LMI applicants. This program is the second CDBG-DR grant that SCOR has completed on-time, following the CDBG-DR grant addressing the historic 2015 floods. Successful management of these grants has led to many other jurisdictions reaching out to SCOR to share lessons learned. SCOR has assisted the following states and local governments: Alabama, California, City of Columbia (SC), Florida, Georgia, Lee County (FL), Lexington County (SC), North Carolina, Richland County (SC), Virgin Islands, Volusia County (FL), Maui County (HI), Sarasota (FL).

Ongoing Disaster Case Management Services

This year, the disaster case management team continued to assist survivors from Hurricanes Matthew and Florence in our housing program and beyond with their unmet needs. This year, the team assisted approximately 365 survivors from Hurricane Florence, in addition to connecting 125 citizens who were impacted by Hurricane Ian and other smaller events that occurred this year to external resources.

Growing the Disaster Recovery Reserve Corps

Successful efforts were made this year in recruiting and training members of the Disaster Recovery Reserve Corps. SCOR held multiple rounds of orientation and trainings (Levels 1-3) for reservists. Following training, reservists stand by ready to be activated with the SCOR Disaster Case Management team in the event of a federally declared disaster to connect survivors to a wide range of resources to meet their disaster caused unmet needs. SCOR currently has 73 reservists, with a goal of hiring 100 Reservists across the State.

Risk Assessment and Mitigation Strategies

Agency Sustainability

A recurring source of funding is critical for SCOR to effectively deploy and implement its statutory obligations. Many of the SCOR's programs depend on grant funding. While grant funding opportunities are expected to continue to be available, the lack of dedicated funding jeopardizes the agency's ability to continue carrying out its mission. Without a dedicated source of funding, the state would lose a wealth of institutional knowledge equipped to coordinate resilience to natural disasters, mitigation of

these risks, and long-term disaster recovery caused by natural disasters. The lack of dedicated funding also makes it difficult to plan long-term.

The Disaster Relief and Resilience Reserve Fund was created to support the Resilience Plan, respond to disasters, and undertake certain qualifying flood or disaster impact mitigation projects. Most of the current balance of the Reserve Fund is set aside to respond to a potential disaster. The 2015 Flood, 2016 Hurricane Matthew, and 2018 Hurricane Florence were disasters that resulted in hundreds of millions of dollars in unmet needs. The Reserve Fund is not designed to make every single loss whole; however, a major disaster would substantially deplete or exhaust the fund. During last fiscal year, SCOR received a one-time allocation of \$200 million to the SCOR Disaster Relief and Resilience Reserve Fund during this fiscal year. These funds will continue to fund resilience and floodplain conservation activities throughout the upcoming fiscal year.

To increase the ability to support implementation of the Resilience Plan, respond to disasters, and carry out flood mitigation projects, SCOR has developed proposals to secure recurring streams of income. Because the Strategic Statewide Resilience and Risk Reduction Plan deals in large part with lessening impacts of disasters on this state’s communities and citizens, one proposal is to fund SCOR and the Disaster Relief and Resilience Reserve Fund with a portion of the insurance premium tax that is collected from property and casualty insurers doing business in South Carolina. The proposal was introduced by Senator Goldfinch in S.731 on April 13, 2023. The proposal will provide for the long-term viability of the relief portion of the fund as well as provide for the effective implementation of the Resilience Plan and mitigation projects. SCOR requests the support of the General Assembly in passing such a bill to provide recurring funding from the tax to the Disaster Relief and Resilience Reserve Fund for purposes of risk reduction.

Workforce Development

Since SCOR began as a temporary agency and many of its programs depend on grant funding, SCOR’s workforce, prior to the passage of the FY 24-25 budget, was largely made up of temporary grant employees (TGE). The new FTE positions make it less difficult for SCOR to build internal capacity as the agency’s mission expands. Recruitment and retention is also likely to improve from this change. SCOR appreciates the support of the General Assembly in providing the agency with new FTE positions to support its important and expanding missions.

Stakeholder Awareness and Buy-In

Because SCOR is still a relatively new agency, some potential stakeholders are not aware of SCOR’s mission, programs, and impact on the State. Lacking stakeholder awareness threatens SCOR’s ability to coordinate resilience and increase the ability of communities, economies, and ecosystems to anticipate, absorb, recover, and thrive when presented with environmental change and natural hazards. This year, SCOR participated in many events, workshops, and meetings to share information on the office, understand stakeholder needs and ongoing efforts, and build relationships with the goal of coordinating statewide resilience. Throughout the fall of 2023, the Resilience Planning team hosted 12 in-person informational events around the state and a virtual event for interested parties to learn

more about the Statewide Resilience Plan and how to utilize it to implement resilience in their communities. Newly hired watershed coordinators began attending existing community events to meet stakeholders where they are, hear needs and concerns, educate them about SCOR programs and resources, and connect them with information and resource providers. The mitigation and disaster recovery departments continue to share information and updates to stakeholders through regular stakeholder meetings, public meetings in areas served by those programs, and sharing lessons learned other entities across the state and nation. Audience reached this year include other state agencies, councils of governments, non-profits, county and local governments, other state governments, state and local political leaders, and individual citizens. SCOR has also released monthly newsletters that goes out to over 1,000 email addresses.

SCOR requests the General Assembly's assistance in promoting understanding of SCOR's mission among public and stakeholder groups and providing information to its constituencies about available resources through SCOR.

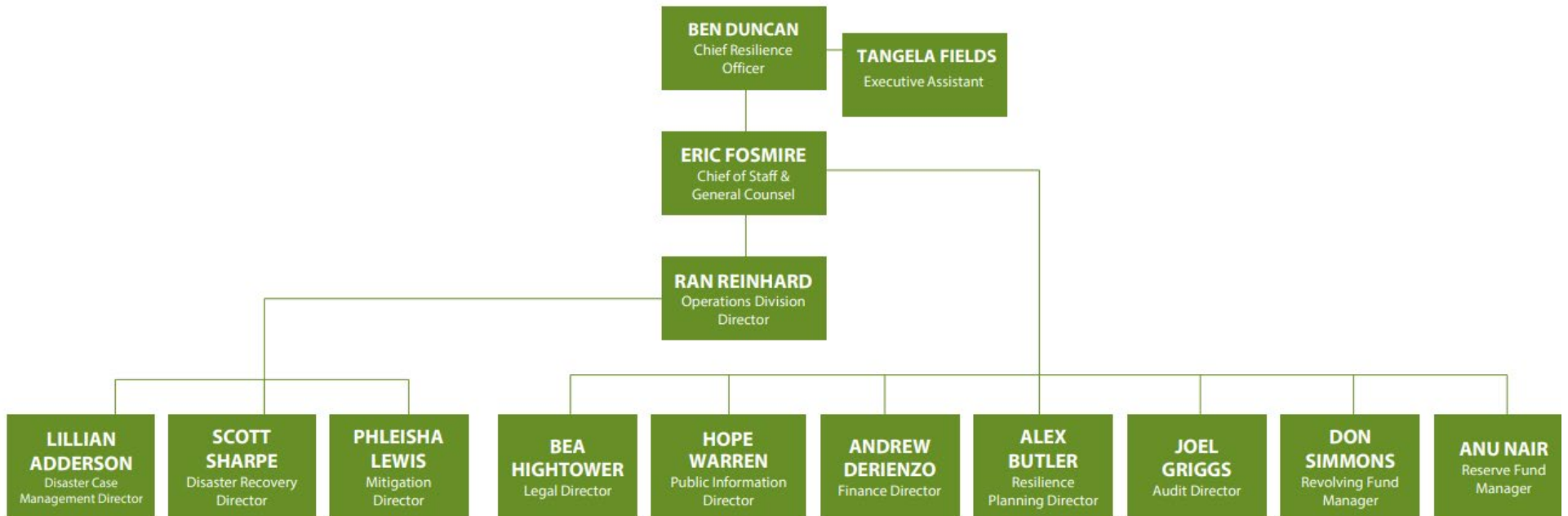
