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### Fiscal Impact Summary

This bill requires all candidates from each political party to pay a filing fee and allows political parties to charge a certification fee to all candidates. This bill also changes the filing period for a candidate in a general election and the filing of party pledges for a candidate in a general election from March 30<sup>th</sup> to March 25<sup>th</sup>.

The State Election Commission anticipates being able to manage any additional responsibilities due to this bill with existing staff and within existing appropriations. Therefore, this bill will have no state expenditure impact.

This bill may result in a change in the total amount of candidate filing fees collected by the State Election Commission. Candidate filing fees are distributed to the commission's Other Funds for the purpose of conducting elections. This bill will require candidates from the two major parties and third-party candidates to pay a filing fee. Candidates from the two major parties currently pay a fee. Additionally, the majority of candidates are either from the two major parties or are non-partisan, who are not required to pay a filing fee. Therefore, this bill may result in a change to Other Funds revenue due to the new filing fees collected from third-party candidates by the State Election Commission.

The Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office (RFA) contacted all counties and the Municipal Association of South Carolina (MASC) to determine the potential local expenditure impact of this bill. We received responses from Charleston County, Dorchester County, and MASC. Dorchester County anticipates this bill will have no expenditure impact. Additionally, Charleston County anticipates this bill may result in an expenditure savings of approximately \$400 as the change in the filing period may reduce the need for overtime pay for county election workers. MASC also anticipates this bill will have no fiscal impact for municipalities.

### Explanation of Fiscal Impact

#### Introduced on January 14, 2025

#### State Expenditure
